**Cornbread Salad ---** serves 6 (Gail Conte brought this to our pot-luck last month)

4 plum tomatoes, chopped 1 green bell pepper, chopped ¼ cup chopped fresh cilantro Kosher salt 1 cup sour cream ¼ cup mayonnaise 2 scallions, minced Juice of ½ lime <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> t chili powder 2 cups crumbled cornbread 2 15-ounce cans black-eyed peas, drained and rinsed 1 cup frozen corn, thawed 1 cup shredded cheddar or Mexican-blend cheese

- 1. Toss the tomatoes, bell pepper, cilantro, and ½ t salt in a medium bowl. Whisk the sour cream, mayonnaise, scallions, lime juice, chili powder and ½ t salt in a small bowl.
- 2. Assemble the salad: Sprinkle half of the cornbread in a glass bowl or trifle dish. Top with half each of the black-eyed peas, corn, and the tomato-pepper mixture, then half each of the sour cream mixture and cheese. Repeat the layers with the remaining ingredients, ending with cheese. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate at least 2 hours or overnight.

## **PLANNING OUR BRANCH FUTURE - FUNDRAISING**



One of the things for which I am extremely grateful is input from the Board on various topics. At the October Board meeting, we discussed a topic that came to me from the branch's most recent past president, Mickey Edell – Fundraising. This is not the first time we have discussed it nor will it be the last. The main concern is raising enough money to fund the scholarships that the Plymouth-Canton Branch sponsors at local educational institutions.

Member dues supply very little revenue for the branch. Of the \$71 members pay annually, \$49 goes to the national association; \$12 goes to the state association; and, \$10 remains with the branch. Last year the branch had 59 members which brought \$590 back to the branch. Most of this money is used to pay a modest honorarium (\$100) to speakers for the branch meetings. Money is also set aside for some activities for Board members to attend and for NCCWSL. Right now, most Board members who attend state meetings, etc. pay their own way. Most of the money that goes to the Scholarship Fund is raised by the children's play and donations by members, enabling the branch to maintain the \$3,500 Fund. Scholarship monies are donated to a female Garden City High School Student, female graduates of the Plymouth-Canton Alternative High School, and female students at Schoolcraft College and Madonna University.

The children's play does not raise the money that it once did, and many other fundraising activities sponsored by the branch were very labor intensive for the members involved. Hence, the discussion about fundraising. Does the Board continue to ask members for personal donations to keep the scholarship fund at its current level like it has done the past two years, or look for another option?

The Board has decided to ask members for their input and ideas. Mickey Edell has graciously agreed to chair a fundraising committee but she needs members and ideas. If you are willing to help with this work, please contact Mickey or me. Our email addresses and phone numbers are below.
