

# MARCH IS WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH MAJOR EVENTS IN WOMEN'S HISTORY: DECADE BY DECADE

**In honor of Women's History Month,** the Smithsonian has chosen one significant event from each decade over the past century. Each event recognizes the achievements of women in all facets of life, who moved history forward.

- **1903:** Marie Currie becomes the first woman to win the Nobel Prize.
- 1912: Juliette Low founded the Girl Scouts of America
- **1920:** Women in the U.S. are given the right to vote.
- 1932: Amelia Earhart flies solo across the Atlantic.
- **1942:** Women serve in the armed forces during World War II.
- **1955:** Rosa Parks refuses to give up her seat on a bus to a white man in Montgomery, Alabama.
- 1966: National Organization for Women is founded by Betty Goldstein Friedan.
- **1973:** American tennis champion Billie Jean King defeats champion player Bobbie Riggs in a "Battle of the Sexes" match.
- **1983:** Sally Ride become the first American woman in space.
- 1994: Congress passes the Violence Against Women Act.
- **2007:** Nancy Pelosi becomes the first female speaker of the House of Representatives.

#### EQUAL PAY DAY - March 12, 2024

# AAUW ANALYSIS OF THE U.S. CENSUS BUREAU AND U.S. BUREAU OF LABOR STATISTICS GENDER PAY GAP DATA REVEALS LITTLE PROGRESS.

Comparing full-time, year-round workers, AAUW found women took home only 84% of the pay that men received. This figure is not statistically different from 2020's pay gap.

Despite pay discrimination becoming illegal in the U.S. sixty years ago, today's data from the U.S Census Bureau and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reveals that the gender pay gap between men and women remains persistent.

AAUW'S more comprehensive calculation compared all women with earnings in 2022 were paid a mere 78% of men's wages. Looking closer at specific groups of women, AAUW found even more startling inequities, compared to the pay of white, non-Hispanic men.

#### Overall

Women working full-time, year-round are **paid 84 cents** and all earners (including part-time and seasonal) are paid **78 cents** for every dollar paid to men.

ARE WE REALLY STILL TALKING ABOUT THIS? #EQUALPAYDAY

**Asian American Women** working full-time, year-round are paid **99 cents**, and all earners are paid **89 cents** for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

White Women (non-Hispanic) working full time are paid 72 cents and all earners are paid 74 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

**Black Women** working full-time are paid **69 cents** and all earners are paid **66 cents** for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

**Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Women** working full-time, year- round are paid **65 cents** and all earners are paid **61 cents** for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

**Latina** women working full-time year- round are paid **57 cents** and all workers are paid **52 cents** for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

**Native Women** working full-time, year-round are paid **57 cents** and all earners are paid **51 cents** for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men.

In dollars and cents, the wage gap for women overall is \$11, 450. These are dollars that could be spent on childcare, buying homes, paying off student debt, and investing in the future. AAUW CEO, Gloria Blackwell, stated, "Legislators and employers must do better. AAUW won't stop fighting until all women are paid fairly and have the same opportunities to build secure economic futures for themselves and their families." Equity is still an issue, Mickey
